

## ALL HANDS ON DECK!

### SLOW the FLOW COLORADO sprinkler inspection program

The Castle Pines North Metropolitan District and the Center for Resource Conservation are partnering again this year on a wildly successful water conservation program titled Slow the Flow Colorado.

Slow the Flow is an intensive and highly customized sprinkler system inspection and performance enhancement program that provides property owners with specific information, tools, and recommendations for conserving substantial volumes of water, while still caring for outdoor vegetation. All property owners, residents and homeowner associations (HOAs) which the Metropolitan District serves are eligible to participate in this program, at no charge, throughout July and August 2012.



Slow the Flow was so successful that we only recently worked through the 100 residential properties wait-listed from last year. The number of available inspections is limited to the first three HOAs and 200 homes that sign up. Inspections will be scheduled on a first-come, first-served basis, so hurry! Please sign up today; it couldn't be easier!

#### Why should I participate?

- You'll receive a customized watering schedule for a green, long-lasting landscape - at no charge!
- You'll learn practical, easy, do-it-yourself sprinkler system maintenance.
- You'll learn how to maximize the life of your sprinkler system and improve its performance.
- You'll take a vital step toward responsible water use, saving money at the same time.

**How long will it take?**  
Approximately 2 hours

**When can I get an inspection?**  
Please schedule your inspection as soon as possible between now and Friday, August 31, 2012.

**Who will do the inspection?**  
Professionally trained water auditors

- What happens at the inspection?**
- A visual inspection to pinpoint any problems in your sprinkler system
  - Tests to measure the precipitation rate of your sprinkler system
  - Tests to determine how evenly the water is covering the intended area
  - Sample and test soil to determine soil type and precipitation depth

After the inspection, the professional inspector will set up a customized watering schedule to meet the specific needs of your landscape. The inspector will also program your irrigation clock and explain how to maximize your sprinkler system's efficiency.

### CHATFIELD RESERVOIR PROJECT Email & Letter Writing Campaign

Whether it's a hot bath at the end of a long day or a cool glass of water to quench your thirst, water is essential. Most of us turn on the faucet and expect that water will automatically flow. We seldom question the source of that water and usually take it for granted.

Securing renewable water supplies is a top priority for the Castle Pines North Metropolitan District and many other water providers in our area. If the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers approves the Chatfield Reservoir Expansion and Reallocation Project, the people and families we serve will benefit from over 940 acre-feet of renewable water storage capacity, thereby easing our community's dependence on the Denver Basin Aquifer System.

Environmental impacts have been identified and a plan to fully mitigate those impacts is in place.

We respectfully ask that each resident please help us persuade the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to approve the Chatfield Reservoir Expansion and Reallocation Project by emailing or mailing a statement of support to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. We also urge each homeowner association we serve to adopt and submit a formal resolution supporting the project.
